Molly Morpeth art award winners named

INTRIGUE, pleasure and even annoyance and shock. These are some of the reactions the winners' works in the Molly Morpeth Canada Trust Major Award of \$10,000.

Watson said she was impressed with the miniature worlds Songstaya created with his work *Morning Dew*. The collection of cast resin orbs are filled with dried plant materials and contemplate the meteorological forces shaping our lives externally, as also existing within us.

Watson was moved by *Morning Dew's* whispers of ecological warning, as it explored themes of nature while hinting at social and human problems to be solved. The orbs are displayed in a rectangular glass case, although this is contrary to how the artist imagined them being shown.

"The artist originally wanted them distributed around the floor of the gallery, but that would be a bit of an occupational health and safety issue... But I do like the idea of these little miniature worlds rolling around and orbiting. Although they are resin, which is a little bit toxic, they are like little water droplets with suspended life in them. It is very Sorawit."

Nine other outstanding works were also recognised with awards. *Like Topo*, a small ceramic work by Dunedin-based Madelaine Child received the Axel Family Runner-Up Award of \$4000. Watson said the kooky work emerged from a sprouting potato the artist had in her studio.

"What also impressed me is that she is obviously deeply immersed in the background of her own craft." The Craigs Investment Partners Youth Award of \$2500 went to Auckland artist Oliver Cain for his ceramic, *Fruit Bowl II*, a urinal filled with ceramic bananas, which Watson said was both in your face and hilarious.

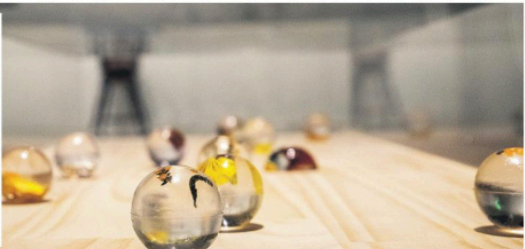

Hannah Valentin's work *Anytime* was one of two Arts Whakatane and Robinson Low Highly Commended awardees of \$1000. The solid bronze piece grapples with difficult concepts and Watson said its seriousness of intent impressed itself on her as judge over time.

"There are comments about the athletic body or the gym body, our desire to improve ourselves yet we are all in this unstable arrangement, and it is asking some questions of the value of some of our activities."

On the other end of the spectrum is *Tolly Yaita*, from Wellington's Three Greens - "Utusasi Akaka's 'Tales' is fun and evocative", said Watson. Watson said they were joyous figures who appeared to be lying in wait and ready to spring forth from the wall for a performance.

"For something that is actually still it has got a lot of animation in it or that potential for movement..." *Useful Object* - remnants from a break-up by Stuart Forsyth, *Cross-Culturalism* by Lisa Passmore and *Pink Coralscape IV* by Chauncey Flay each received merit award prizes of \$800 each.

with this object that was once a piece of art but was now a functional useful item, a toilet roll holder, and then started returning to thinking maybe it was art or symbolised the time of the break-up.

Dunedin artist Linda Clews was awarded the Local Artist Merit Award for her delicate reflection on the fragile bonds stretching between lovers, friends and family that can ultimately form the strongest of supports.

Her piece, *Bridge Between Two Walls*, is constructed of cables ties and bird netting, and Watson was impressed by its dexterity. Watson said she liked the seriousness and ambition of Passmore's kite, titled *Cross-Culturalism*.

have two different functions, so she has found a way of putting them together... they represent two quite different forms of storage, so putting them together she is putting together two worlds or ideas and it is possibly also her two worlds clashing."

Pink Coralscape IV by Chauncey Flay is another merit award winner with his work constructed with coral mixed with builders' fill.

"It is another of this kind of weird reconstituting nature, a bit like the Sorawit piece people are messing up and engaging the natural and unnatural," said Watson. An exhibition of the finalists can be viewed at Te Koputu, Whakatane library and exhibition centre until April 12. Visitors are encouraged to vote for the work they think should receive the People's Choice Merit Award.



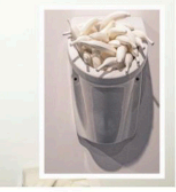
